Introduction to Reliable Holiday Patterns (Winning Strategy 5)

You're never guaranteed a taxable jackpot, no matter what you do. You are simply trying to improve your winning odds here and there as the opportunities, such as *reliable and winning holiday patterns*, present themselves.

All careful players are trying to do is choose times when their odds of winning are slightly improved, thereby moving the dial on their personal payout return percentage from around the low 90% to slightly over 100% - which is when making a gambling profit happens.

Again, making money, rather than losing money, is the intent here. Whether your goal is to spend this money on your own entertainment, earning more comps, or taking it home is entirely up to you.

By using your own gambling records, the time around holidays can offer a winning opportunity you can take advantage of yourself. It may take you a year to learn how the casinos you frequent on holidays are set up to financially respond to holiday crowds.

But, in lieu of you having your own gambling records for holidays, I am offering you the reliable holiday patterns I've discovered over the last few years at my own nearby casinos.

Major (And Not So Major) U.S. Holidays ... at Casinos

The last two months of each year brings three major holidays to the United States, including Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's. There are also so-called "almost" holidays immediately before and after, like Black Friday after Thanksgiving Day as well as Christmas and New Year's Eves.

Certainly these holidays and almost holidays are very busy days at casinos due to their holiday status. Given the frankly tremendous casino attendance usually seen on each of those 6 days, it was relatively difficult to pick up stable gambling patterns.

But, I did learn a few reliable holiday patterns. These patterns can be applied to the other holidays of the year. Further, you can apply them to other almost holidays such as Derby Day.

Perhaps you are surprised at just how busy casinos can get on holidays. It's usually not so busy on Christmas morning, but the casino buffet line can be quite long at dinner.

Hopefully, you won't be as surprised as I was to discover first-hand how busy any casino, but especially U.S. racinos, on the day when the Kentucky Derby horserace is run.

The first time I was at a casino on Derby Day, unbeknownst to me at the time, I remember arriving early one year at the Prairie Meadows Racetrack and Casino just east of Des Moines, Iowa. After a while, I began noticing how incredibly busy it was.

Plus, what was up with all the great hats?? The great hats are a Derby Day tradition, if you didn't already know. Do you have your own great hat? I certainly hope it's got a big feather!

Data Mining Your Gambling Records for Holiday Wins

Looking back through my financial gambling records, I can say that I have indeed won an individual taxable jackpot on a major holiday or on its associated "Eve" or "After" day.

On the morning of Thanksgiving Day, only a few years ago, I won three taxable jackpots playing slot machines. These jackpots were for \$2,500, \$2,400, and \$1,600. These jackpots were won at 3:35 a.m., 4:00 a.m., and 12:01 p.m., respectively.

Unfortunately, my gambling records from that time are not as complete as they would eventually become, as that holiday was less than 2 weeks after my return to gambling after having been away for almost 10 years.

Going further with my later gambling records, I can see that, based on non-taxable jackpots earned and amount of bankroll cycling that collectively occurred on holidays, it is an excellent time to attend a casino between these major holidays.

I'll mention at this point that keeping good gambling records is well worth doing. It is, of course, great for preparing for filing your annual income tax returns. But it is also excellent for analyzing just such gambling performance for the casinos near you.

For example, did you go to the casino last year on New Year's Eve? How did you do and, based on your own gambling records, what should you do this next New Year's Eve?

A Special Type of Casino Special Events: Holidays

The reliable holiday pattern is, in some ways, similar to my previous discernible winning pattern regarding special events. I mentioned this in my slots winning strategy 4, which is all about the winning advantages of casino special events.

With special events, I've won many taxable jackpots when attending casinos not long after the large crowd from the night before have left but before the new day has quite begun.

This winning strategy can also be applied by treating major holidays as another casino special event. In case you haven't already learned about the casino special events winning strategy, I'll briefly go over it. For full details, take a listen to my last podcast episode 33 with show notes available at https://professorslots.com/e33/.

As with special events, the best time I've found for these winning occasions are between 4 a.m. and 6 a.m. in the morning after a casino has had a large crowd the night before. When I've come in the morning after such days between 7 a.m. and 9 a.m., the effect doesn't seem to still exist.

Winning Early in the Morning the Day After Holidays

Casino special events such as holidays include a hidden advantage, which results in an improved slots gambling performance. But, there is a downside: Having to visit the casino VERY early in the morning.

The most reliable pattern I discerned was to come in after the crowds had mostly gone home, say around 4 a.m. or 5 a.m. the next day. This means attending the mornings after major holidays and the mornings after almost holidays like Saturday morning after Black Friday or any casino on the day after the Kentucky Derby.

What I'd noticed was that the casino wanted to give out jackpots to keep individuals in the crowd happy by winning jackpots, or seeing others win jackpots.

As I've explained in detail in Winning Strategy 4, given such large crowds the casino was likely doing quite well in terms of revenue, so paying out a few, or even a lot of, jackpots would hardly negatively impact the correspondingly huge amount of revenue coming in.

However, it seemed as though the casino kept giving out jackpots even after the crowds had gone home. By 8 a.m. or most certainly by 10 a.m. the next morning, they'd generally stop doing that. But, when I went in early after a big night for the casino, I could generally pick up one or more taxable jackpots at little expense.

On the morning of Thanksgiving Day, I won three taxable jackpots. At the time, I wasn't tracking special events, so I do not have a record as to whether or not a special event was held that Wednesday.

Knowing how casinos operate, I suspect they most certainly did. If they did not, then it would have been a missed opportunity for their business. I won none the following day, on Black Friday, but my records show that I didn't come in early.

My Largest Taxable Jackpot So Far

I won my largest taxable jackpot to date a few days before Christmas Day, for \$27,000. This large jackpot happened at 5:40 a.m. It was second of four taxable jackpots I won between starting playing slots at 5 a.m. and finally stopping at 8:40 a.m.

As was my habit when winning taxable jackpots, I liked to get the cash. After paying the required state taxes, this \$27,000 amounted to \$25,353. This was the first time I won a jackpot worth more than \$5,000.

Because I requested cash, I learned three surprising things when the jackpot was paid out:

- 1. The casino slot attendant needed to be accompanied by a floor manager for approving any jackpot of \$10,000 or more;
- 2. The casino slot attendant didn't count out the individual \$100 bills into my hand, but rather sent down a banded bundle of one hundred \$100 bills; and
- 3. The pockets of my jeans would only hold \$20,000, and a mobile phone, without any \$100 bills peeking out.

In the days afterwards, I traveled to see distant family over the Christmas holiday that year - so I have no recorded data for that potential winning opportunity. Mostly, I was just trying to absorb having won 45 taxable jackpots in 42 straight days over a total of 18 casino visits.

I returned a few days afterward that Christmas to win three taxable jackpots over a period of 35 minutes starting 10 minutes after I began playing at 4:45 a.m. on Saturday morning after a busy Friday night at the casino.

This was during the weekend between Christmas and New Year's. I didn't win any taxable jackpots on the day after, on Sunday. But, then again, I had not arrived until 7:45 a.m. that morning.

Summary of Reliable Holiday Patterns (Winning Strategy 5)

In summary, *Reliable holiday patterns* are a type of casino special event, but worth mentioning as a separate winning strategy. This is because non-holiday casino special events typically have a smaller attendance than seen at casinos on most major holidays.

Holidays are casino special events, but the winning advantage for holidays is even greater than special events. I guess you could say holidays are special, special events.

Keep a good financial gambling record, possibly even with observational notes of each casino visit, because it is useful in so many different ways. One of these useful ways is they provide the opportunity to find winning strategies in your own gambling patterns.

But, if you don't keep your own gambling records, then consider the reliable winning patterns I've found in my own gambling records.

Introduction to New York Slots 2018

Up next is the second segment of the show on slot machine casino gambling. Here, I provide a brief overview of the current state of gambling in three U.S. states, territories, or federal district emphasizing, by far, anything of interest to slot machine casino gamblers.

Up first is New York slot machine casino gambling 2018. Here goes.

New York slot machine casino gambling currently consists of 23 casinos and parimutuel racinos, including:

- 9 Pari-mutuel wagering racinos, all with slot machines;
- 6 Class III American Indian casinos (with Las Vegas-style gaming, including slots);
- 4 Class II American Indian casinos (with bingo-style gaming);
- 3 Commercial casino resorts, with a fourth opening in mid-2018;

- 2 Canadian casino resorts, located in Ontario across the Canadian border from Buffalo; and,
- Cruise ships departing from the New York Manhattan Cruise Terminal.

Slot machines at Class III American Indian tribal casinos in the state of New York are actually video lottery terminals controlled by the New York State Lottery, which are required by state law to have a minimum payout return of 92%.

Betting results for slot machines at commercial casinos and pari-mutuel racinos are controlled on location per usual machine internal microchip or casino central server. No minimum payout return appears to be available, but actual payout return statistics are publicly available for the 4-month fiscal quarters of each year.

Relevant Legal Statutes on Gambling in New York

The legal age for gambling is 21 for casinos run by the Seneca Nation of Indians through the Seneca Gaming Corporation, but 18 for other casinos in the state of New York.

American Indian tribal casinos in the state of New York only had Class II bingo halls from 1988 with the launch of the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act through 1993. In 1993, the first Class III Las Vegas-style gaming casino opened after a state-tribal compact was negotiated with the federally-recognized St. Regis Mohawk Tribe.

Slot machines at tribal casinos in New York are video lottery terminals, which is often abbreviated as VLTs, controlled by the New York State Lottery. These electronic games are typical video slot machines, with the exception that the results of a bet are determined by the central lottery system. By state law, these VLT slot machines are required to have a minimum payout return of 92%. No actual payout return statistics are publicly available.

At non-tribal casinos, the result of a bet on a slot machine is not determined by the state lottery server, but instead by a microchip in the machine itself or by a central computer located in the casino. A minimum payout return percentage for non-tribal casinos does not appear to be publicly available. However, actual payout returns are publicly reported by the state gaming commission, as I will discuss momentarily.

Quite interestingly, and this is not the only section of this document which is highly interesting, the state gaming regulations has a Section 5319.45: Software Requirements for Percentage Payout. While I could paraphrase what it says, the actual wording is interested. So, in their words, it reads:

a) "If progressives, bonus systems, merchandise and so on are external to a game's prize pool, the values shall not be included in the percentage-payout calculation. The independent testing laboratory approved by the commission shall provide the

minimum and maximum theoretical payout percentage for the game within a certification report, unless otherwise noted. Additional external awards added to a game shall require a re- evaluation of the theoretical payout percentage, considering the value of the award and other relevant factors. The independent testing laboratory approved by the commission shall re-evaluate a game's theoretical payout percentage when requested."

- b) "Gaming devices that may be affected by player skill shall meet the requirement of this section when using a method of play that will provide the greatest return to the player over a period of continuous play."
- c) "The minimum percentage requirement shall be met when playing at the lowest end of a non-linear pay table (i.e., if a game is continuously played at a minimum bet level for the cycle of the game and the theoretical return to the player is lower than the minimum percentage, then such pay table is not permissible)."
- d) "Double-up or gamble options shall have a theoretical return to the player of 100 percent."

Slot Machine Private Ownership in New York1

Next up is a usually short statement about slot machine private ownership, which I have included in case you live in this U.S. state and are considering owning a slot machine. Here it is:

It is legal to privately own a slot machine in the state of New York if it is 30 years old or older.

Gaming Control Board in New York

In 2012, the New York State Division of Lottery was merged with the New York State Racing and Wagering Board to create the New York State Gaming Commission.

As a result, the New York State Gaming Commission regulates all aspects of gaming activity in the state of New York, including:

- All forms of pari-mutuel wagering, including harness and thoroughbred horse racing;
- Class III tribal gaming (maintains a 24-hour presence and verifies employees);
- State lottery, including video lottery terminals in and outside of casinos; and,
- Charitable gaming.

The New York State Gaming Commission has a relatively long Mission Statement on their About webpage, which I will forgo reading to you. In brief, it says all the usual excellent things we've come to see in Mission statements from state gaming boards. It uses phrases like ensuring lawful gaming, conducting themselves with the highest integrity, protecting consumers in a responsive and effective manner, and etc.

Further, the Commission provides the general public with both monthly and weekly Commercial Gaming Reports for each commercial casino resort on their Gaming webpage.

Payout return percentages for slot machines are publicly available for both the commercial casinos as well as pari-mutuel wagering racinos. These reports are available for each quarter of a year. For the second quarter of 2017, the following payout returns were reported to the Commission:

- Batavia Downs Gaming & Hotel: 91.54%
- Del Lago Resort & Casino: 91.01%
- Empire City Casino: 93.10%
- Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack: 91.90%
- Hamburg Gaming at The Fairgrounds: 91.49%
- Jake's 58 Hotel & Casino: 93.27%
- Monticello Gaming & Raceway: 92.21%
- Resorts World New York City: 94.14%
- Rivers Casino & Resort Schenectady: 90.30%
- Saratoga Casino Hotel: 92.21%
- Tioga Downs: 91.43%
- Vernon Downs Casino Hotel: 91.44%

From this list, Resorts World New York City has the highest reported payout return of 94.14%, followed closely by Jake's 58 Hotel & Casino at 93.27%.

The lowest reported payout return is Rivers Casino & Resort Schenectady at 90.30% followed closely by Del Lago Resort & Casino at 91.01%.

Casinos in New York

The largest casino in the state of New York is the Resorts World Casino New York City. It operates approximately 5,550 gaming machines and 475 table games. The second largest is the Seneca Niagara Casino & Hotel in Niagara Falls, operating approximately 3,300 gaming machines and 100 table games.

In late 2013, the New York state legislature created four commercial casino resort licenses. Three have already opened. The fourth, Resorts World Catskills, opened in mid-2018.

All casinos in the state of New York, plus 2 nearby Canadian casinos across the border from the Buffalo-Niagara area, are listed in my website article on New York Slot

Machine Casino Gambling 2018 available as a link to this podcast episode's show notes at professorslots.com/e34 or directly at professorslots.com/NY.

On the list of 25 casinos you'll find there, I provide the casino website, town, and whether or not it is a tribal casino, a non-tribal casino, or a racino racetrack facility having VLT slots.

If it is a tribal casino, I further note whether it offers either Class II bingo-style slots or the more typical Class III Las Vegas style slot machines.

Summary of New York Slots 2018

In summary, New York slot machine casino gambling currently consists of 25 casinos and pari-mutuel racinos, including two Canadian casinos across the border from Buffalo. Cruise ships with on-board casinos also depart from the New York Manhattan Cruise Terminal.

Video lottery terminals exist at Class III tribal casinos in the state of New York. These actual slot machines are controlled by the New York State Lottery, and are required by state law to have a minimum payout return of 92%.

Actual payout returns for slot machines at commercial casinos and pari-mutuel racinos are publicly available for the 4-month fiscal quarters of each year.

Introduction to North Carolina Slots 2018

Up next is North Carolina Slot Machine Casino Gambling 2018. Here goes.

North Carolina slot machine casino gambling consists entirely of two American Indian tribal casinos, established by negotiated state-tribal gaming compacts subsequently approved by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Tribal casinos in North Carolina are not required to provide payback return percentages to the state, but must maintain a payback return on all video machines to be between 83% and 98%. Further, video games are required to be games of "skill or dexterity", so slot machines in North Carolina operate differently than might otherwise be generally expected.

Relevant Legal Statutes on Gambling in North Carolina

The minimum legal age for gambling in North Carolina is 21.

North Carolina has a single federally recognized American Indian tribe, the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. The tribe has built two casinos on its Qualla Boundary lands located in the Great Smoky Mountains. The tribe also operates a high-stakes bingo hall.

Video poker machines were once widespread in the state, but in 2000 state regulations were enacted which limited video poker machines to three per location as well as banning the installation of any new machines. After nearly a half dozen attempts, state legislature finally completely banned commercially-owned video poker machines and video gaming machines in 2007.

The state-tribal gaming compact between the state of North Carolina and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, which allows video games of skill or dexterity, is available online. In part, it defines Video Game as an approved Glass III game, where it is defined as:

""Video Game" means any electronic video game or amusement device that allows a player to play a game of amusement involving the use of skill or dexterity...."

Slot Machine Private Ownership in North Carolina

Regarding slot machine private ownership, it is legal to privately own a slot machine in the state of North Carolina if it is 25 years old or older.

Gaming Control Boards in North Carolina

North Carolina does not have a state gaming commission.

Casinos in North Carolina

North Carolina's two casinos, both tribal casino establishments, have types of "skill or dexterity" based video slot machines.

The two casinos in North Carolina are owned by the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians tribe but operated by Harrah's, a division of Caesar's Entertainment. These two casinos are:

- Harrah's Cherokee Casino in the town of Cherokee; and
- Harrah's Cherokee Valley River Casino & Hotel in the town of Murphy.

Summary to North Carolina Slots 2018

In summary, North Carolina has long resisted expansion of gambling. North Carolina slot machine casino gambling consists of two American Indian tribal casinos. Both tribal casinos are operated by Caesars Entertainment, but wholly owned by the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians by use of the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act of 1988.

Tribal casinos in North Carolina are not required to provide payback returns to the state, but are required to provide payback return percentages of at least 83% to a maximum of 98%. Further, North Carolina slot machines are legally required to be video games of skill or dexterity.

Introduction to North Dakota Slots 2018

Up next is the third of three states comprising this episode segment: North Dakota Slot Machine Casino Gambling 2018. Here goes.

North Dakota slot machine casino gambling currently consists of five Native American tribal casinos. As required by the negotiated state-tribal gaming compacts approved by the U.S. Department of the Interior in 2013, gaming machines have a payout return between 80% and 100%. Slot machines at tribal casinos are allowed a maximum total bet of \$25.

North Dakota also have a wide selection of sites, over 800 locations state-wide, for charitable gaming. Blackjack is common, as is bingo, pull tabs, punchboards, twenty-one, calcuttas, sports pools, paddlewheels, and poker. However, there are no legally-allowed slot machines at these locations.

There are also two racetrack pari-mutuel facilities, Chippewa Downs and North Dakota, as well as a series of Off Track Betting locations in the state. Again, there are no legally-allowed slot machines at these locations.

Relevant Legal Statutes on Gambling in North Dakota

The minimum legal age for gambling in North Dakota tribal casinos is 21. Most charitable gaming sites also have a minimum legal age of 21 restriction, with bingo being the exception where a minor may play bingo is accompanied by an adult.

On March 11, 2013, the U.S. Department of the Interior approved five negotiated state-tribal gaming compacts allowing Class III casino-style gambling at American Indian tribal casinos. At these tribal casinos, the maximum bet is limited to \$25.

Video games of skill, such as video poker and video blackjack, have a minimum payout return of 83%. Typical slot machines are required via the state-tribal gaming compact to have a payout return of at least 80%.

Slot Machine Private Ownership in North Dakota

Regarding slot machine private ownership, it is legal to privately own a slot machine in the state of North Dakota if it is 25 years old or older.

Gaming Control Board in North Dakota

The North Dakota state gaming commission is a division of The Attorney General's Office. This Gaming Division is responsible for:

- Charitable Gaming
- Tribal Gaming
- North Dakota Lottery

With regards to Charitable Gaming:

"The Gaming division enforces and administers charitable gaming in North Dakota, performs audits and investigations of gaming organizations; reviews gaming tax returns, administrative complaints, and provides training for charitable gaming organizations."

With regards to Tribal Gaming:

"The Gaming division also enforces the tribal-state gaming compacts, which authorize the state's Native American tribes to conduct gaming at casinos on tribal land. The division conducts random inspections at the state's five Indian Casinos to ensure game integrity and compliance with wager limits and prize payout ratios."

With regards to the North Dakota Lottery:

"The North Dakota Lottery is responsible for administering, regulating, enforcing, and promoting the state's lottery."

Casinos in North Dakota

The largest casino in North Dakota is the Dakota Magic Casino Resort in Hankinson. It has 1,001 gaming machines and 18 table games. The second largest is Sky Dancer Hotel Casino & Resort in St. Michael. having 820 gaming machines and 10 table games.

The 5 casinos in North Dakota are:

- Dakota Magic Casino Resort in Hankinson;
- Four Bears Casino & Lodge in New Town;
- Grand Treasure Casino in Trenton:
- Prairie Knights Casino & Resort in Fort Yates; and
- Sky Dancer Hotel Casino & Resort in St. Michael.

Again, typical slot machines are required via the state-tribal gaming compact to have a payout return of at least 80%, with video games of skill being limited to 83%. Monthly gaming statistics are not publicly available, as the state-tribal gaming compacts for these American Indian tribal casinos do not require them.

Summary

In summary, North Dakota slot machine casino gambling currently consists of five tribal casinos. Typical slot machines are required to have a minimum payout return of 80%, or 83% for video poker, video blackjack, and other video games of skill. Maximum bets are \$25.

North Dakota also have a wide selection of Charitable Gaming sites, two racetrack parimutuel facilities, and an assortment of Off Track Betting sites. However, slot machines are not legally allowed at these locations.

The largest casino in North Dakota is the Dakota Magic Casino Resort in Hankinson, which is 50 miles south of Fargo. The second largest is Sky Dancer Hotel Casino & Resort in St. Michael. located 120 miles northeast of Minot.

On the Next Episode of Professor Slots
